To the Colorado Joint Budget Committee:

Colorado is at a turning point in the fight for affordable health care. The decisions made today will determine whether families, businesses, and policymakers have the tools to rein in costs, expand access, and ensure Coloradans' dollars are spent wisely. For more than a decade, the Colorado All Payer Claims Database (CO APCD) has been at the center of that effort, providing the state's most powerful, data-driven resource for improving health care affordability, equity, transparency, and efficiency. With over 1.1 billion claims covering more than 70% of insured Coloradans, the CO APCD isn't just useful, it's essential.

More than a data source, the CO APCD is a cornerstone in Colorado's efforts to create a smarter, stronger, and more affordable health care system. State agencies, legislators, researchers, and employers rely on it to tackle some of the toughest challenges in health care, from lowering costs and improving quality to addressing social determinants of health. Communities and providers depend on CO APCD insights to shape evidence-based solutions and guide cost-effective care to ensure Coloradans receive high-quality, value-based care without unnecessary spending.

Here are a handful of examples of how the CO APCD continues to support better health, better policy, and lower costs for Colorado:

- Cutting Costs, Bringing Billions to Colorado The Division of Insurance's
 Reinsurance Program is projected to <u>save Coloradans \$493 million on premiums</u> in
 2025, while the Colorado Option Plans continue to save families millions of dollars a
 year. Both programs use CO APCD data to measure impacts and drive key decisions.
- Eliminating Billing Surprises to Protect Coloradans Colorado was a front runner
 with the <u>out-of-network legislation (HB 19-1174</u>), which was used as the basis for the
 Federal No Surprises Act. CO APCD data is used to establish the annual maximum
 reimbursement rates for the bill, protecting Coloradans from unexpected, devastating
 surprise bills.
- Providers Use CO APCD to Provide Better, More Affordable Care Colorado
 Children's Hospital and the University of Colorado used CO APCD data to demonstrate
 decreased hospitalizations and ED visits as well as decreased costs for medically
 complex children using an innovative care management program.
- Without the CO APCD, We're Just Guessing at What Works Research published in JAMA used CO APCD data to determine that <u>Colorado's insulin copay cap significantly</u> <u>reduced out-of-pocket costs for patients with Type 1 diabetes</u>, and lead to better medication adherence and fewer complications.

- Ensure Dollars are Spent Wisely A study in HealthAffairs used CO APCD to show
 that Colorado's extended Medicaid postpartum coverage increases the use of mental
 health treatment for new moms and reduces costs. The CO APCD is fueling work by
 world-renowned researchers that evaluates the real-world impact of Colorado's health
 policies at no cost to Colorado residents.
- CO APCD Data Empowers Employers and Strengthens Insurance Markets The
 transparency provided by CO APCD price data empowers Colorado's employer
 insurance alliances to negotiate lower rates with providers, not only saving Coloradans
 and employers millions of dollars a year on premiums but also <u>strengthening market</u>
 <u>competition</u>—health care transparency isn't just about costs, it also helps protect
 consumers from anti-competitive practices.
- **Keeping Health Care Competitive** The Urban Institute recognized the <u>CO APCD as a critical safeguard against hospital monopolies</u>, ensuring market competition and preventing unchecked price increases a tool most states don't have.
- Keeping Colorado a National Leader Colorado's position as one of the healthiest, innovative, and most <u>transparent</u> states in the nation is furthered through CO APCD data, which empowers innovative solutions to health care challenges.

Defunding the Colorado APCD isn't just a budget decision, it's a step backward for Colorado's health care system and economy. Without this data, policymakers, businesses, and communities will be forced to make decisions blindly, without a reliable, independent source of data to track costs, improve access, or address equity. The CO APCD has been instrumental in making health care more affordable, holding insurers and hospitals accountable, and securing millions in savings for Coloradans. Defunding it now would erase more than a decade of progress, leaving the state without the very tool that makes smart, cost-effective health care policy and practice possible.

The undersigned strongly support the continued viability of the Colorado APCD. Without it, we lose the ability to rely on transparent, independent data to tackle rising health care costs, improve access, and drive policy solutions that work for all Coloradans.
