Prescription Drug Rebates in Colorado

Prescription drug rebates are provided by manufacturers to health insurance payers and Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBMs) as an incentive to cover their drugs under their health insurance plans. The ultimate goal is to help lower overall costs for the health plans, and while that remains true for Medicaid, some argue that it does not lower costs for Medicare Part D patients. Additionally, in Colorado, commercial payers were not required to begin using rebates to reduce premiums and drug costs for employers and members until January 2024.





From 2021 to 2023, Drug Rebates and Total Drug Spending Increased

Across all payers, drug rebates rose 30%, and total prescription drug spending rose 24% when subtracting drug rebates received by payers.




Percent Rebates of Total Prescription Drug Spending Continues to Rise

Specialty Drugs Account for the Majority of Drug Spending Commercial Payers, 2023


Specialty drugs accounted for almost half of total prescription drug spending among commercial payers, but represented just 1% of total volume.
